











Weather Discussion & Extended Outlook										
<p>A Low pressure center over southern B.C. is still bringing cold air aloft over NW Wyoming. Not much moisture in that, so only light accumulations today. That Low disappears tonight as we come under an increasingly strong Westerly flow that develops from the Pacific to the northern Rockies by Wednesday morning. A large & powerful Low pressure center out in the mid-Pacific will move to the Gulf of Alaska the next 2 days. That Low will be directing a continuous flow of Pacific moisture over us the rest of the week. Especially Wednesday thru Thursday. Temps will be warming up, winds will be increasing, and heavier snowfall will falling the mountains...so, the AVALANCHE DANGER is going to rise. (733-2664 or www.jhavalanche.org) Snowfall Totals through Saturday (keeping in mind that snow settlement will occur): around 1 to 2 feet in valley locations, around 4 feet in in the mountains. Snow and this Westerly flow will continue into the weekend, with only a few brief breaks in the clouds & snowfall thru Sunday, and winds decrease a little. Looks like we stay in a West to NW flow Mon. thru Wed. of next week, with some new snow each day.</p>										
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
